Today, Europe is undergoing all kinds of crises from all sides ...

- Economic crisis that persists at the heart of the Eurozone and continues to nourish dissensions between supporters and opponents of the budgetary discipline, supporters and critics of a monetary devaluation;
- Political crises inside and in the periphery of the Union that seem to enlarge the mirror of European weakness to lead a common and efficient foreign policy, as observed in the examples of Syrian and Ukrainian crises;
- Lastly, institutional crisis. The European elections of May,-supposed to validate a democratic progress because for the first time the elections had a direct influence over the president of the European Commission- have seen, particularly in France, the rise of populist parties and reflect Eurosceptism.

Inefficient, rigid, distanced, unjust... is Europe at a breakdown? In order to move forward and to avoid the risk of a pure and simple disintegration, it seems necessary to structurally redefine the European model.

At the time of constitution of a new Commission, Bosphorus Institute has thus wished to introduce its annual seminar by a projection on the future institutional and economic scenarios, on their outcome for enlargement and on perspectives about a common future for Turkey and the European Union.

In the occasion of the First World War's centennial, Bosphorus Institute wanted also to reflect on the birth of 20th century's conflicts and their consequences for Europe and Turkey: How to surpass the obstacles of History? How to transcend these breaks for creating opportunities of reconciliation, like, for example, on the question of Cyprus gas? The big yard for transatlantic negotiations, the next meeting of G20 can also constitute equal amount of economic and geopolitical leverage in the short and medium term.

Institut du Bosphore celebrates its 5 years. It's an occasion to renew its commitment to the European project and to engage between past and future, between outcome and projection, a deep reflection on the meaning of our common future.

WHICH ECONOMIC GOVERNANCE FOR WHICH POLITICAL EUROPE?

Facing the rise of Eurosceptics, which new scenarios to propose to reinvent the European project? In the favor of economic and financial crises, it seems that political Europe is highly conditioned by the success of economic Europe and that it has recently showed the limits of its governance within the Eurozone.

How to rethink a Europe as a better defined project with more agile mechanisms? Which structures of governance permit institutional deepening of the Eurozone and a form of enlargement that can include candidates like Turkey? "Europe of circles", "'Variable-geometry' Europe"... Visions for tomorrow's Europe do exist and in spite of their differences, all of them are marked by the seal of pragmatism.

Peace is certainly the greatest acquis of the European project: it had been its raison d'être, it might as well be the key to its future.

II - ENERGY : SOURCE OF CONFLICTS OR SOURCE OF HOPE?

Energy is more than ever at the heart of the major stakes for the future of Europe: security of provisions, climate consequences, regional conflicts... Geostrategy often makes energy rhyme with conflict; tensions with Iran and the Ukrainian crisis have recently become disappointing proofs. However, geostrategy can also constitute a source of hope and an integration motor for the Europe-Turkey relation: redefinition of energy





routes in the Black Sea and the Mediterranean Sea, and especially the exploitation of the deposits recently found in Cyprus can help reopen many adhesion chapters that are blocked today.

STRATEGIC STAKES AND INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION BETWEEN TURKEY AND A REDEFINED EUROPE

This round table proposes to analyze the recent stance taken by the European Union and Turkey on the international scene, especially on the Iranian and Ukrainian questions and their influences in the field of international cooperation. The two have not always agreed on all issues, yet there is little doubt that Turkey's adhesion would reinforce the EU's position in the international scene. It could also constitute a more influent democratic axis and act as counterweight against nondemocratic currents. What are the political and economic opportunities of this kind of reinforcement? Will TTIP negotiations and Turkey's G20 Presidency in 2015 be occasions for deepening French-Turkish co-operation and Turkey's European integration process?
